***Letter of D.D. Wead to "Jakey,"  
June 5, 1866***



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Shelburne June 5. - 1866

Dear Jacky

Before you receive this I suppose you will have heard that the Fenians have assembled in some force (there are said to be 300 or 400 in Fairfield) and it is supposed they contemplate going into Canada perhaps in the vicinity of Franklin. Cousin Thomas more feels uneasy about his daughters thinking that perhaps they <sup>may</sup> have their fears aroused and became alarmed and so he has come up here to consult with us about what is best to be done. We have seen your uncle Jenkins & this is the conclusion that if the girls suffer from fear and wish to come home that you

must get them some conveyance  
to St John's immediately and they  
can come from there by Railroad.  
I do not apprehend any trouble  
<sup>to</sup> <sub>any of</sub> you, if you stay quietly at St  
John's and that is Uncle Jephus' <sup>opinion</sup>  
but he does not know  
but Lizzie might feel uneasy  
and wish to get home, as to  
yourself you can do as you please  
but I see no reason for your  
leaving though the girls should  
do so - should Lizzie come away  
and you stay you must get board  
where you can though I should  
greatly prefer you to board with  
Madam Sedgwick. I shall send you  
some money by first opportunity.  
I send this to St Albans to night  
(Sunday) hoping you may get it  
tomorrow night. We are all as well  
as usual  
Write immediately.      Yours affectionately
