Luigi Lucioni (1900-1988) Collection, 1875-2006 MSA 666

Introduction

The collection consists of several documents, articles, books and miscellaneous papers. The materials were found in Luigi Lucioni's residence, which had been sold after his death. The collection was given to the Vermont Historical Society by Sharron and Frank Kropa of Manchester Center, Vermont in 2012. It is stored in one archival flip top box and consumes .25 linear feet of shelf space.

Biography

Luigi Lucioni was born in the little village of Malnate in Northern Italy in 1900, among the foothills of the Alps. By the age of nine he was attending night classes with the stone-cutters of the village in order to study ornamental drawing. At the age of ten, Lucioni and his family came to America. He studied painting at Cooper Union and the National Academy of Design.

In 1929, Electra Havemeyer Webb, a board member of the Metropolitan Museum of Art, invited Lucioni to spend his summers painting at the Webb's Shelburne Farms. A few years later he bought a farm near Manchester and divided his year between his Greenwich Village studio and his farm. He took short trips around Vermont and captured through his etchings, the soul of the state, the strength of the granite hills and the trees, and the rambling houses and streams.

Lucioni earned several prizes during the 1930s and 1940s, and at age thirty-two was the youngest painter ever to have his work purchased by the Metropolitan Museum of Art. *Life* magazine called him "Vermont's painter laureate." The Shelburne Museum has a large collection of his prints.

Scope and Content

The eight folders in this collection contain several items owned by Lucioni as well as several articles about him. Included is a small book entitled, *How to Paint*, that was found on the easel at his house, an Italian cookbook, and a listing of Manchester, Vermont, appraisals. Also included is a poster for an exhibit of his work at Shelburne Museum, an exhibit catalog from Associated American Artists, a list of etchings being sought by a collector and an oral history interview with Lucioni.

Related Collections

The VHS museum holds several items that came in with this donation. They are cataloged under accession number 2011.38. The museum also has artwork by Lucioni.
