Introduction

The Cate Family Papers consist of letters, photographs, sermons, notebooks, examples of student work from Japanese schools, postcards, printed programs, pamphlets, and Japanese ephemera from the families of Calais, Vermont, Universalist missionary (Isaac) Wallace Cate (1862-1908), his wife Ella Stimson Cate (1865-1938), and their children. The papers were given to the Vermont Historical Society by Weston A. Cate, Jr., grandson of Wallace Cate, in 2008 (ms. acc. no. 2008.14). In 2021, Phillip Dennis Cate, also a grandson of Wallace Cate, added to the collection with a donation of additional letters, photographs, and ephemera. The papers occupy six document boxes, three oversize folders, and one flat box of oversized photographs; they consume 7 linear feet of shelf space.

Biographical Notes

(Isaac) Wallace Cate, son of Lemuel and Jerusha Pitkin Cate, was born in Calais, Vermont, July 20, 1862. He was educated at Goddard Seminary and graduated from Tufts in 1889. At Tufts he developed a life-long friendship with L. Weston Attwood. Cate was ordained in 1890 and later that year he traveled to Japan where he served the Universalist's Japanese Mission until 1897.

After he returned to the United States, Cate was the superintendent of the Ohio Convention (Universalist) and later served a pastorate in Machias, Maine. In 1901, the Cates returned to Japan, but Wallace's declining health compelled them to return to the United States in the spring of 1908. He died May 11, 1908, on board ship during the return journey.

Ella Stimson Cate was born September 27, 1865, in Medford, Massachusetts, the daughter of Royal and (Annie) Maleen Richardson Stimson. In 1887, she graduated from the Curry School of Expression in Boston, which later became Emerson College.

In 1891, after a lengthy courtship, Ella joined Wallace Cate in Japan where they were married in September of that year. During their years in Japan the Cates raised a family and both became proficient in the Japanese language.

After Wallace's death in 1908, Ella returned to Japan to teach "English and dramatic art" at Waseda University. She retired in 1928 and returned to the U.S. after a round the world tour. For a brief time in 1928 and 1929 Ella and her son (Philip)

Harding Cate, owned the Oriental Shop in Nashua, New Hampshire, where they sold imported merchandise.

Her collection of note cards suggests she was lecturing and writing during the 1930s. She died in 1938.

The Cates' Children

1) Esther Cate was born July 1, 1892 in Tokyo. She graduated from Goddard Seminary and Jackson College (Tufts). She taught school in Cabot and Richford, Vermont and Wallingford, Connecticut. She died July 29, 1982.

2) Weston Attwood Cate born Feb. 27, 1894 was a graduate of Goddard Seminary, Tufts College and St. Lawrence University (1918). After his ordination in 1918, he served Universalist churches in St. Johnsbury, Woodstock and South Woodstock, Vermont, as well as churches in New Hampshire, Maine, and New York State. He married Arlene Jeffords of Williamstown, Vermont. Their son Weston A. Cate, Jr., the donor of the papers, married Jean Stetson.

3) Philip Harding Cate was born August 26, 1902. He graduated from Goddard Seminary in 1921 and later worked as an interpreter of Japanese events in the State Department in Washington, D.C. In 1928, he worked in an Oriental Shop in Nashua, New Hampshire, a joint business venture with his mother. He died in Hawaii on Sept. 4, 1997.

4) Paul S. Cate was born March 9, 1900. After his marriage in 1928 to Masu Cate (1902-55), a Japanese citizen, the couple made their home in Japan in the 1930s. He returned to the United States in 1938 and died Feb. 10, 1942.

5) Ione Chizuko Cate was born Nov. 18, 1906. She married Clarence Nelson. She died December 30, 1994.

Isaac Wallace Cate's siblings

Susan (Susie) Cate, born March 1, 1872, was educated in "the rural schools of Calais" and the Randolph Normal School. She married Carroll J. Lamb of East Calais and was a resident of that town until her death Sept. 20, 1929. They had no children.

Henry Ward Cate, was born March 8, 1865 and married Eva Bancroft (1873-1953); they resided in East Calais. He died in 1940.

Stimson family

(Annie) Maleen Richardson and Royal Stimson, parents of Ella Stimson Cate, married Oct. 22, 1864 in Boston and made their home in Medford, Massachusetts. Royal died in 1898.

Scope and Content

The Cate Family Papers consist of letters, photographs, sermons, notebooks, examples of student work from Japanese schools, postcards, printed programs and pamphlets, and Japanese ephemera from the families of (Isaac) Wallace Cate (1862-1908) and his wife Ella Stimson Cate (1865-1938) and their children. Wallace Cate, born in Calais, Vermont, and his wife served as Universalist missionaries in Japan between 1890 and 1928.

Photographs

A sixth of the collection, or one document box, consists of photographs. About half of these are photographs of Wallace and Ella Cate and their children. The remainder of the photographs is Ella Cate's Boston area forebears the Stimsons and Richardsons, and Jean Cate's relatives, the Stetsons and Tower families from Williamstown, Vermont. Among the oldest photographs is an undated daguerreotype of Ella Cate's grandmother as well as several undated tintypes of Stetson and Tower family members. The only related written records from these families in the collection are a few letters from Royal Stimson to his daughter between 1891 and 1896.

Wallace Cate

The focus of the collection is Wallace and Ella Cate and dates from the time of their courtship in the 1880s until their deaths in 1908 and 1938 respectively. Several large groups of Wallace Cate's letters include those he exchanged with Ella before their marriage as well as his correspondence with his friend L. Weston Attwood from 1902 to 1908 during the Cates' second assignment in Japan.

Cate's professional obligations are evident in letters he received as superintendent of the Ohio Convention (Universalist) during 1898 and 1899; and again during his second assignment in Japan when he was involved in a discussion about the future of the Japanese Universalist mission.

In addition to letters, Wallace Cate's writing includes sermons, notebooks, and a textbook. The sermons, arranged by the date he delivered them, include several in Japanese. The contents of the notebooks include notes about his health, prayers and poetry, as well as information about the Japanese Mission and an account of the arrival of Mr. and Mrs. Arthur Lobdell.

Cate co-authored two editions of *New Conversations for the Classroom, English for Japanese Students.* In the introduction he states: this "is the only book for the study of English in Japan which has a complete system of conversations and full and explicit directions for conducting them."

<u>Ella Cate</u>

The majority of Ella Cate's letters in the collection are those she wrote to Wallace prior to their marriage. For a short period in 1899, however, Ella wrote to Wallace when his brief assignment in Ohio separated them. She wrote of their children, her concerns about money, and her wish to be together.

Ella saved letters from two of her correspondents: J. Murray(?) McGregor, an Englishman who accompanied the Cates on their journey home in 1908, and Lillian Brown Kitashima, a transplanted American and Waseda University colleague and Tokyo resident. McGregor shared Ella's keen interest in literature and the theater and was her source of news of the 1908-1914 London theater scene until he was drafted into the British army.

In a 1923 letter from Tokyo, Kitashima vividly details the destruction in that city and environs after the great earthquake and fire. Kitashima's letters resume in 1928 after Ella Cate returned to the United States and continue until 1934. Her letters are gossipy but also have a serious side when by 1931 she writes of the country's depression and the country's invasion of Manchuria. In later letters she writes of the threat of a larger war involving the United States. Kitashima was also source of news about Paul Cate and his wife who lived in Tokyo during this period.

After Wallace's death Ella and her children returned to Japan where she taught at Waseda University until 1928. In addition to university publications, Ella saved student work both writing and art from her Japanese students as well as that of her own children. Unsigned work by the Cate children is filed under Ione Chizuko Cate. Japanese ephemera from this period include post cards, greeting cards, and song books as well as miscellaneous examples of art, writing and calligraphy.

Ella Cate's only published work is the collection in a Christmas short story from the *Japan Advertiser*. Her miscellaneous writing, and notebook, and note cards include essays, stories, ideas for projects (writing or lectures?) as well as notes about books she had read. Her 1928 round the world tour includes a diary for half of the journey.

Ella Cate's short-lived unsuccessful 1928 Oriental Store venture is well documented. The record includes bills and receipts, a ledger and invoices for Japanese shipments.

Second generation

The letters and postcards that belonged to Ella and Wallace Cate's children are not only scattered but also represent disparate periods in their lives. Two groups of letters to Ella from Weston and Paul that she saved suggest, however, that these letters were special. In 1928 Weston expressed his concerns about the Oriental Shop and in 1938 he wrote frequently during his mother's final months. Paul Cate's letters to his family from 1928 to 1938, trace his life and marriage to a Japanese woman in pre-World War II Japan. In a poignant late 1937 letter he writes of his decision to return alone to the United States due to the worsening political situation. Paul's collection of English language Japanese travel brochures from this period adds a further dimension to the Japanese related materials in the papers. Paul's wife, Masu Cate, was a Japanese citizen and important Art Deco Dress designer in Japan. Two biographies of Masu are included in the collection and contain photographs of the couple and their family.

Letters from Phillip Harding Cate to his mother and Dr. Hollister portray a free spirited man. In letters to his mother Harding informs her that he has taken a break from his studies at Goddard Seminary and expresses his desire to travel the world. Harding did graduate from Goddard Seminary in 1921 and later worked in the department of state in Washington, D.C. and with his mother at their oriental store in Nashua, New Hampshire. His son, Phillip Dennis Cate, is a donor of these papers.

Preliminary Work on the Papers

Jean Stetson Cate, wife of the donor, organized and researched the papers before they were given to the Vermont Historical Society. Her work is evident throughout. Her arrangement of Wallace and Ella Cate's letters has been retained and her notes on their contents are located in Doc 585:0.1.

In Ms. Cate's introduction to the papers, "Cate Story Journal," (Doc 585.0), she wrote a brief biography of both Wallace and Ella Cate as well as an "appreciation" of their lives. She made many handwritten notes (Doc 585:0.2) on a variety of subjects: information about the Cate and Stimson families; "unsolved questions;" lists of individuals represented in the papers; and chronologies.

Ms Cate acquired the photocopies of Wallace Cate's letters to Porter Dale from the University of Vermont (Doc 585.3) as well as the photocopies of Cate's letters to Luther W. Attwood from the Andover-Harvard Theological Library (Doc 585: 31-36).


