## **Introduction**

The Willard Family papers consist of the papers of lawyer, newspaper editor and U.S. Congressman Charles W. Willard (1827-1880) and other family members, particularly his son Charles W. Willard, Jr. (1869-1922) and his father-in-law Hezekiah H. Reed (1795-1856), all of Montpelier, Vermont. The collection spans the period from 1837-1917 and is housed in seven archival document boxes, consuming seven linear feet of shelf space.

## **Provenance**

The Willard Family papers were purchased by the Vermont Historical Society from Nicolas A. Kovach, a publisher and bookseller in Los Angeles, California, circa 1947-1950.

## **Biographical Note**

Charles Wesley Willard was born on June 18, 1827, in Lyndon, Vermont, the son of Josiah Cahoon Willard (1787-1830) and Abigail Carpenter (1788-1869). He was an 1851 graduate of Dartmouth College, N.H., and thereafter studied law with Peck & Colby in Montpelier, Vermont. In 1853, he began practicing law in Montpelier as a partner of Ferrand F. Merrill.

Willard married Emily Doane Reed (1830-1886), daughter of Hezekiah Reed (1795-1856) and Martha Pitkin Barnard (1800-1846), in 1855. The Willards had four children: Mary Willard (1857-1944), Ashton Rollins Willard (1858-1918), Eliza (Elisa) May Willard (1868-1941), and Charles W. Willard, Jr. (1869-1922).

Willard served as Vermont Secretary of State from 1855-1857, and as a senator from Washington County in 1860 and 1861. He became the editor and proprietor of the *Green Mountain Freeman* in 1861, and remained so until 1873. He was the editorial chair of the *Milwaukee Sentinel* for a brief time in 1865. Willard won the election to serve Vermont as a Republican U.S. Representative from the First District in the 1868, 1870, and 1872 elections, serving as a U.S. Representative from March 4, 1869-March 3, 1875. He served as chairman of the Committee on Revolutionary Pensions and the War of 1812. In addition, he served on the Committee of Foreign Affairs and the Committee on Reform in the Civil Service. At the end of his service as U.S. Representative, Willard's health was declining and he was eager to leave Congress. He missed 31.1% of votes in his last session (the Forty-third U.S. Congress) which was unusual for him. He lost the election of 1874 to Charles H. Joyce. After his term in Congress, he resumed the practice of law in Montpelier. Willard was appointed to the Commission to Revise the Statutes in 1878 by his former Dartmouth College classmate Governor Redfield Proctor (1831-

1908). *Report upon the Revision of the Laws* by C.W. Willard and W.G. Veazey was published in 1880.

Willard lived most of his adult life in Montpelier, except for a short time in 1865 when he resided in Milwaukee and during sessions of the U.S. Congress when he and his family found lodging in Washington, D.C. He was known as a prolific writer; much of his writing was published in his own and other newspapers. As a young man, he dabbled in poetry. He wrote a number of speeches as U.S. Representative. He was known as a hard worker and an honest politician. Charles Wesley Willard died of consumption, after years of ill health, on June 8, 1880.

Emily Doane Reed (1830-1886), wife of Charles W. Willard and daughter of Hezekiah Reed (1795-1856) and Martha Pitkin Barnard Reed (1800-1846), was born in Montpelier in 1830. She attended St. Johnsbury Academy, Mt. Holyoke Female Seminary (1846-1848), and graduated from Troy Female Seminary in 1849. Her sisters were her twin, Eliza Spalding Reed (1830-1911), Mary Bowland Reed (1826-1859), Cornelia Agnes Reed (1828-1847), and Gertrude Huyck Reed (1833-1854). Emily Reed Willard died days after an operation in Boston of "Paral of lungs" in 1886.

Mary Willard (1857-1944), the eldest daughter of Charles W. and Emily Willard, was born in Montpelier in 1857. She never married, had her own income and probably did not work outside the home. She lived in Germany and Switzerland from 1883-1885, and at various times lived with her brother Ashton in Boston and her sister Elisa in Pittsburgh. She and her sister Eliza were friends with author Willa Cather while living in Pittsburgh. She moved to San Francisco in 1922, the year her brother Charles died. She lived with her sister Elisa in San Francisco for many years until her sister died in 1941. Mary Willard died in San Francisco in 1944 at the age of 87, living a longer life than her siblings and parents.

Ashton Rollins Willard (1858-1918), the eldest son of Charles W. and Emily Willard, was born in Montpelier in 1858. He graduated from Dartmouth College in 1879. He lived his adult life primarily in Boston, though he spent several years in Italy. He was an author; his published works include "Sketch of the Life and Work of the Painter Domenico Morelli," "History of Modern Italian Art," and the "Land of the Latins." He married Agnes Fairbanks (1860-1910), the daughter of Governor Horace and Mary Fairbanks, in 1888. They had one daughter, Theodora Fairbanks. Ashton Willard died in 1918.

Eliza (Elisa) May Willard (1868-1941), second daughter of Charles W. and Emily Willard, was born in Montpelier in 1868. She was a graduate of the New York State Library School and worked as a librarian in Montpelier for a while. She organized the Reference Department at Carnegie Library in Pittsburgh, where she was a librarian for much of her adult life. She wrote "What a Public Library Finds to Do," published in 1917. After retiring, Elisa lived in San Francisco with her sister Mary, until her death in 1941.

Charles W. Willard, Jr. (1869-1922), youngest child of Charles W. and Emily Willard, was born in Montpelier in 1869. He graduated from Harvard in 1891, and

received his law degree in 1896 from the University of California. He married Julia Frances Reid in 1897. He spent his adult life as a prominent attorney in San Francisco. Julia died in 1917 and Charles died in 1922.

### **Scope and Content**

The Willard Family papers consist of the papers of Charles W. Willard (1827-1880) and other family members, particularly his son Charles W. Willard, Jr. (1869-1922) and his father-in-law Hezekiah H. Reed (1795-1856), all of Montpelier, Vermont. There are some papers of his son Ashton R. Willard (1858-1918), and daughters Mary Willard (1857-1944) and Eliza (Elisa) May Willard (1868-1941). Also included are papers of his wife Emily Reed Willard (1830-1886) and her sisters Mary, Gertrude, Cornelia, and Eliza Reed. The Willard Family papers together with the Hezekiah Reed papers (MS 126-127) document an extended Montpelier family (though by the late 1800's the family scattered to other states).

The Willard Family papers are divided into four series: Family Correspondence, Congressional papers, Legal/Business Material, and Miscellaneous Material.

#### I. Family Correspondence

The largest series within the Willard papers consists of Family Correspondence. Included are a number of letters (1848-1863) to Charles W. Willard (1827-1880) from Dartmouth College classmates. The letters concern politics, religion and whether to drink alcohol. His friend Hitchcock urged Willard to pursue a political life and wrote about the "fugitive question." There is also a diary Willard wrote while a student at Dartmouth.

Other letters include an 1856 letter concerning Ferrand F. Merrill's efforts to procure the "Speakership," and an 1862 letter from Ryland Fletcher of Proctorsville, Vermont, regarding the Civil War. There are a number of letters from U.S. Senator Justin Morrill spanning the years 1864 to 1878 concerning a variety of political issues. An 1865 letter from U.S. Senator Luke P. Poland describes the strengths and weaknesses of Morrill. An 1865 letter from C.C. Spaulding concerns Reconstruction and an 1868 letter from Norman Williams requests Willard to do a favor for Robert Lincoln. There are letters concerning Civil Service Reform, a letter (1876) urging Willard to be a candidate for governor, and an 1880 letter from Governor Redfield Proctor.

In addition, the Family Correspondence includes some letters (1864-1882) to his wife, Emily Reed Willard (though none from Willard). There are letters from Emily's sister Mary Reed Clark, primarily to her stepmother Amanda Lamb Reed (Mrs. Hezekiah Reed, 1806-1857). Letters from N.G. Clark, Mary's husband and Willard's brother-in-law, concern Mary's declining health, her death, and financial matters. A few letters (1862) from Amanda Lamb Reed's son James Lamb concern James Lamb's service in the Civil War. There are a number of letters spanning from 1850 to 1878, from Willard's brother Andrew Jackson Willard that discuss family and politics. Letters from brother-in-law A.C. May (the husband of Emily's twin sister Eliza) sent from his home in Milwaukee, primarily concern business matters.

There are some letters (1871-1882) from Charles and Emily's son Ashton, many of them written while Ashton was attending Dartmouth College. Included is a letter Ashton wrote about his visit to the Shaker Village in Enfield, N.H. while he was attending Dartmouth.

Letters (1893-1917) from Charles and Emily's son Charles W. Willard Jr (1869-1922) to his sister Eliza (Elisa) May Willard are abundant (including a few from Elisa to Charles). The bulk of these letters are written from Charles' home in San Francisco to Elisa at her home in Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania. Charles was an attorney and Elisa was a librarian at Carnegie Library. The letters concern travels, health, books, cultural events, friends and family (including their sister "Marie", and brother Ashton). There is a letter about the 1906 earthquake in San Francisco, as well as letters concerning the Panama–Pacific International Exposition in San Francisco in 1915, Walt Whitman, *War and Peace*, Elisa's European trip, and life in San Francisco. Elisa and her sister Mary were friends with author Willa Cather in Pittsburgh and Charles' letters mention Cather a few times. (A 1941 letter from Willa Cather to Mary ("Marie") Willard in *The Selected Letters of Willa Cather*, edited by Andrew Jewell and Janis Stout, stated that "May (Elisa May) [Willard] has been my friend since I was twenty years old...".) Charles letters to Elisa cease in 1917, the year his wife Julia died.

In addition, there are some earlier family letters, including a couple of letters to Martha Barnard Reed (Emily Reed Willard's mother) from George Bowland (dating 1837-1842), correspondence regarding the illness and death of Cornelia Reed (1847) and letters to Mary, Gertrude, Emily and Eliza Reed (1847-1848).

## II. Congressional Papers

The Congressional series consist of papers from the year Willard was elected to the U.S. Congress in 1868 to the end of his service in 1875. This series has copious material concerning various appointments, including letters and petitions regarding requests to remove, retain and appoint Vermont Postmasters, requests for appointments for U.S. Attorney for the district of Vermont, Office of Assessor, Office of U.S. Marshall, U.S. Pension Agent, and cadetships to West Point. There are letters regarding pension claims for the Revolutionary War and the War of 1812, as well as applications for bounty land. There are letters regarding Civil War pensions, including a letter from the Chief of Finance Division of Pension Office which includes statistics about the work of the office. There are several letters concerning women's rights, including an 1872 letter from suffragist Isabella Beecher Hooker (1822-1907), an 1870 letter from State Geologist Albert David Hager (1817-1888), and an 1870 letter from Rev. W.H. Lord (1824-1877).

In addition, there are letters and petitions about increasing the duties on imports to protect U.S. Manufacturers, particularly the Vermont Slate Company. A number of letters and other material from Eliakim Persons (E.P.) Walton (1812-1890) concern legislative apportionment. Willard worked tirelessly for Civil Service reform, which is reflected in numerous newsclippings, letters, speeches and bills. One letter concerns Ku Klux legislation and Mr. Sumner's Civil Rights bill. There are letters, bills and reports regarding China and Japan "Indemnity Funds", as well as speeches, newsclippings, notes and letters concerning Cuban affairs. Furthermore, the series contains additional speeches by Willard and other U.S. Representatives and Senators. Other correspondents include

John A. Page (1814-1891), Charles Dewey (1826-1905), Ryland Fletcher (1799-1885), Paul Dillingham (1799-1891), and Julia C.R. Dorr (1825-1913).

### III. Legal/Business Material

This series includes papers relating to Willard's law practice dating from 1853 until his death in 1880. Included are incorporation papers of the Roxbury Verde Antique Marble Company, papers relating to the charter of Newbury Seminary, papers regarding the "McClure case," *Scovil vs. Howard*, and various Washington County writs and affidavits. Letters suggesting ways of clarifying and revising the Vermont statutes and other material documents Willard's work on the Vermont Statutes Commission (1879-1880).

The bulk of this series concerns the litigation between Vermont Central Railroad and Vermont and Canada Railroad which carried on for over thirty years (c. 1851-1883). Willard was solicitor for the Vermont and Canada Railroad Company and the records document his involvement in the case, primarily in the 1870's. Included are letters from James R. Nichols (President of Vermont and Canada Railroad), letters from the legal firm Bangs and Wells, letters from the legal firm Prout and Walker, and letters from John B. Page (President of Rutland Railroad). Included are Supreme Court law briefs, statements of accounts, depositions, testimony, petitions, newsclippings, memorandum opinions, agreements and reports. There is also material concerning the Montpelier and Vermont Junction Railway, the Lamoille Valley Railroad, Wells River Railroad, and the Rutland Railroad.

This series also contains a substantial amount of business papers (dating from 1836-1857) of Hezekiah H. Reed (Willard's father-in-law). Willard served as administrator of Reed's estate. Most of the papers concern Reed's land investments in Illinois, Michigan and Wisconsin and include correspondence, accounts, bills, and receipts. There are some Lamb family papers (1819-1842) as well. Hezekiah Reed married the widow of Center Lamb (c.1802-1842) in 1848. These papers include Center Lamb's business papers as well as letters his father Larned Lamb sent to his son Center in Barre, Vermont, while he traveled to Kentucky and Louisiana. In addition, there is material that came into Willard's possession as the administrator of the estate of Mahlon Cottrill (1797-1864).

### IV. Miscellaneous Material

This series consists of Charles Willard's school essays, as well as essays by his sons Charles Willard, Jr., Ashton R. Willard, and other family members. There are also Willard family receipts, bills, and accounts primarily from Montpelier businesses for food, clothing, fire insurance, and household supplies. This series includes some unidentified photographs, and a variety of newsclippings. There are programs for two Montpelier concerts (1873-1874) and a broadside for a Montpelier comic opera (undated), a Montpelier Annual report (1878), and Report of Bailiffs (1865).
