The driver education program teaches students proper driving methods as well as how to follow the rules of the road.



Through diligent study and among keen competition, some of us departed with well-earned scholastic honors, after receiving praise from our fellow students, friends, and proud faculty.








The Student Council is the student governing body of Spaulding. Each year, four members are elected from each class to serve on the council.
